Knowing the Local Heritage through Artistic Education

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Abstract

This presentation presents part of the research which is being developed within the scope of the Doctorate in Child Studies in Artistic Education, particularly on the Visual Arts. It aims to understand the impact of the textile craftsmanship of Guimarães embroidery on the development of technical-artistic skills, communication and expression abilities, critical and creative thinking, visual and aesthetic sensitivity, problem-solving, and the promotion of the region's culture and intangible heritage, as well as in the design and experimentation of local artifacts.

The research seeks to value the region's cultural heritage by introducing textiles as new pedagogical practices, taking as a reference some contemporary art, promoting a dialogue between tradition and contemporary practices to develop new learning opportunities for students and also raise awareness of the importance of preserving heritage as a form of identity and community belonging.

The qualitative study was implemented over six months in 2023, using a participatory methodology involving students aged 10 to 15 from two public schools in Guimarães, differentiated by their sociocultural and economic contexts. Research data were collected through anonymous surveys. Ethical principles and data protection standards were followed to ensure the protection of participants, with consent forms signed by their legal guardians. The study followed the guideline of Soares, Sarmento, and Tomás (2005), which emphasizes that "valuing children's voices and actions" is essential.
